MiroSot Competition

The FIRA MiroSot competition rules shall be followed. Each match shall have two (2) halves of five (5) minutes each. The team that scores the more number of goals shall win a match.

The eight (8) teams will be put in to two (2) groups (a and b). Taking lots will group the teams, and will fix the schedule of the preliminary round matches.

The preliminary round of matches will be held in league. With four (4) teams per group, twelve (12) matches will take place in the preliminary round.

In the preliminary round of matches, each winning team will receive three (3) points and the loser zero (0) points. In the event of a tie, both teams will receive one (1) point each.

The top teams from each of the two (2) groups (a and b) will qualify for subsequent matches. The top team will be decided based on the total number of points won. In the event of a tie in number of points, the following criteria will be used in order of priority:

1. Direct comparison – winner of the match between the two.
2. Goal difference.
3. Flipping a coin.

Four (4) teams (two teams per group) qualify to the following round, and competitions will be held in cup.

After the preliminary matches, the winner of a match shall be decided based on the number of goals scored. In the event of a tie, the golden goal scheme shall follow: a normal game shall continue for three (3) minutes, and the team that scores the first goal shall be declared as the winner. If no goal is scored, each team shall take three (3) consecutive penalty kicks. If the tie persists, each team will take penalty kicks alternatively, until a winner is decided.

1. Executive Committee for Refereeing

2. Committee of Refereeing and Panel of Referees

There shall be a chief referee, an assistant to the chief referee and a panel of referees. Each team is requested to help in refereeing. (Please volunteer!)

Dr. Elmer Dadios will be the chief referee. Mr. Myung-Jin Jung will be the assistant to the chief referee. Mr. Myung-Jin Jung will take over Dr. Elmer Dadios's responsibilities in the event of the later is not in a position to discharge his duties.

3. Procedures

- 3.1. There will be a senior referee, an assistant referee (timekeeper) for each game.
- 3.2. The chief referee will decide the referee for each game.
- 3.3. Any team may request of the chief referee that they have a different referee.
- 3.4. The referee's decisions must not be argued about during the game.
- 3.5. Any team may complain about any decision to the chief referee of the Committee of Refereeing. This committee will attempt to solve the problems to the satisfaction of everyone involved. They may suggest any solution acceptable to the participants.
- 3.6. Teams not satisfied with the decisions of the Committee of Refereeing may request of the Chief Referee that the Executive Committee of Refereeing review their complaint.
- 3.7. The Executive Committee of Referees will attempt to resolve the dispute to the satisfaction of everyone involved. They may suggest any solution they think appropriate.
- 3.8. The decisions of the Executive Committee are absolute and binding on all involved. There is no further appeal.

4. Disqualification

Each team shall be given 15 minutes preparation time, just before the commencement of a match. If a team fails to enter in to the match after the allowed 15 minutes of preparation time, an additional 5 minutes shall be given. Failing to enter in to the concerned match even after the additional preparation time, that team shall be disqualified from that match and the opponent team shall be declared as the winner.

Please note: by participating, all teams signify that they accept these procedures.
